From Pastor Tom's Desk...

"...I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances." (Philippians 4:11)

When the apostle Paul wrote these words, he was speaking of a lifetime of experience - some full of joy, some full of struggle. He goes on to talk about the experience of plenty and want, suggesting that as long as he has Christ, he can get through anything. Recognizing the sufficiency of Christ is the foundation of contentment, which in turn produces a heart of thankfulness.

In contrast, our culture continually attacks our sense of contentment through the barrage of advertising that is a part of our daily experience. In fact, the goal of advertising is to create a sense of discontent; to make us say to ourselves, "I need that thing." Even beyond, "I can't be really happy unless I have that thing." So the cultural environment causes us to focus on what we don't have, instead of what we do have. This may be good for the economy, but it's not good for our spiritual development.

Such discontent is actually the root of covetousness. The tenth commandment says, "You shall not covet your neighbor's house, or his wife, or his servant, or his donkey, or anything that belongs to him." We usually think of covetousness as desiring something that belongs to someone else. I had an older gentleman in one of my churches who used to say, "I wish I had my neighbor's __, and he had a better one! He thought wishing his neighbor better fortune negated his covetous attitude.

Unfortunately, he was mistaken. The root of covetousness or discontent is simply greed - desiring material needs. We have virtually everything we need materially. (That's why advertisers spend millions of dollars to convince us that we need something which we really don't need!) When we realize how blessed we are materially, and then add to that the spiritual blessings that are available to us in Christ, our hearts will overflow with a sense of gratitude.
